9:40am – 10:10am	Youth Crime and Youth Justice Overview 2018 Report - Mr Bob Atkinson AO APM Mr Atkinson will speak to the 2018 Atkinson Report on Youth Justice, giving an overview of the review and sharing his insights.
10:30am – 11:00am	Keynote Address: - Professor Lorraine Mazerolle, University of Queensland Professor Lorraine Mazerolle is an Australian Research Council Laureate Fellow and a Professorial Research Fellow at the University of Queensland. Her research interests are in experimental criminology, policing, drug law enforcement, regulatory crime control, and crime prevention. She has won numerous awards and is currently the co-chair Crime and Justice Group, Campbell Collaboration, Fellow of the American Society of Criminology (ASC), the Academy of Experimental Criminology (AEC) and the Academy of the Social Sciences, Australia (ASSA).

	Professor Ross Homel has been a Foundation Professor of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Griffith since 1992. Professor Homel is a highly cited social scientist (with an hindex of 50), having published approximately 200 books, edited volumes, peer-reviewed papers, chapters, and high impact government reports.
	Professor Homel has provided a video statement for the symposium and Dr Molly McCarthy will share her insights after this contribution.
	Dr Molly McCarthy is a Griffith University Postdoctoral Research Fellow. Her research interests include exploration of the drivers and characteristics of chronic youth offending, variations in offending and policing responses across communities, and economic assessments of criminal justice system issues.

4:00pm – 4:30pm	Links between addiction, impairment and youth crime - Dr Hayley Passmore, Telethon Kids (Recording) In 2018 working with Telethon Kids Doctor Hayley Passmore was part of a team of academics to publish "Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD): Knowledge, attitudes, experiences and practices of the Western Australian youth custodial workforce" this work highlights alarming links to FASD and impairment in Youth offenders in Western Australia. Dr. Passmore will consider this research and share insights.
